Street, water repairs significant highlights of Thursday's Abilene City Council meeting

Street and bridge repairs will be a big part of Thursday's regular Abilene City Council meeting, which also will include potential approval of a major water project.

The council will vote to approve a bid with Bontke Brothers Construction for long-awaited pavement rehabilitation on Sayles Boulevard.

The up to \$4.5 million contract involves rehabilitation of Sayles, from Buffalo Gap Road to South Danville Drive, and will be paid for through remaining funds from the city's 2015 bond election.

ALMOST ALL TEXAS BUSINESSES ARE ALLOWED TO OPEN AT 50% CAPACITY, GOV. GREG ABBOTT SAYS

Gov. Greg Abbott announced his third phase of reopening Texas businesses during the coronavirus pandemic, allowing virtually all of them to operate at 50 percent capacity.

Restaurants were already permitted to be open at 50 percent capacity. Abbott is allowing them to immediately increase their table size from six people to 10, and on June 12, they can ramp up their capacities to 75 percent.

JOBS INCREASE BY 2.5 MILLION IN MAY

The May numbers suggest an economic upturn may be at hand, reports CNBC.

The numbers: "Employment stunningly rose by 2.5 million in May and the jobless rate declined to 13.3% according to data Friday from the Labor Department that was far better than economists had been expecting."

Beating expectations: "Economists surveyed by Dow Jones had been expecting payrolls to drop by 8.333 million and the unemployment rate to rise to 19.5% from April's 14.7%."

A historic jump: "The May gain was by far the biggest one-month jobs gain in U.S. history since at least 1939."
