ABILENE CHAMBER SURVEY RESULTS

Two weeks ago, your Chamber conducted a survey of its valued partners to gain customer service insights and further understandings of the business climate under the continuation of COVD-19.

Overall, the Big Country business community outlook has remained the same, with respondents expressing the belief that the state of the regional business climate will remain strong over the next 12 months.

Almost 55 percent of respondents stated their employee headcount was about the same compared to pre-COVID-19, but 27 percent of the 85 respondents cited workforce as the primary challenge facing their business

MARCUS DUDLEY, JR. NAMED CITY OF ABILENE'S NEXT CHIEF OF POLICE

The City of Abilene and its Police Chief Search Committee is pleased to announce Marcus Dudley, Jr. will serve as Abilene's next Chief of Police.

"Mr. Dudley exhibits the servant leadership, commitment to fairness, and professional expertise that is necessary to lead one of the best police departments in the state of Texas. The search committee also consisted of three APD officers, Taylor County District Attorney James Hicks, Taylor County Sheriff Ricky Bishop, and Abilene Police Foundation President Joy Ellinger.

The Greater Texas Foundation has awarded a \$715,742 grant to help develop Texas State Technical College's performance-based education initiative. The grant was awarded through The TSTC Foundation.

Performance-based education allows students to have flexibility with their schedules as they master set competencies in their programs. Faculty members guide the students as they take courses.

"Performance-based education pathways allow students to build on their existing knowledge and complete credentials without putting the rest of their lives on hold," said Sue McMillin, president and chief executive officer of the Greater Texas Foundation. "We are proud to support TSTC in developing these pathways to extend postsecondary opportunities to more Texas students."

The money will be used to hire three instructional designers to reshape nine of TSTC's programs in the next three years. Performance-based education is scheduled to debut in fall 2021 in the Computer Networking and Systems Administration, Cybersecurity, and Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning Technology programs.

ENERGY SECTOR SLOW TO RECOVER FROM MALAISE ARISING FROM EFFECTS OF GLOBAL PANDEMIC

After absorbing a big hit from the COVID-19 pandemic, the energy sector may take until 2022 to recover. An upswing in petroleum consumption provides hope that the worst has passed, as economic activity gradually increases from April lows.

While crude oil prices have bounced back, they aren't sufficiently high to spur new drilling. The price of benchmark West Texas Intermediate crude oil has stabilized at near \$40 per barrel after averaging \$38 in June and \$17 in April. The demand slump was most notable on April 20, when producers were forced to pay buyers \$38 per barrel as the price of the expiring near-term oil contract price collapsed on worries that there was no place to store deliveries.

Even at current levels, prices barely cover operating expenses. The average price per barrel needed to cover operating costs is \$23–\$36, while profitably drilling a well requires prices of \$46–\$52, according to the Dallas Fed Energy Survey in early 2020.
